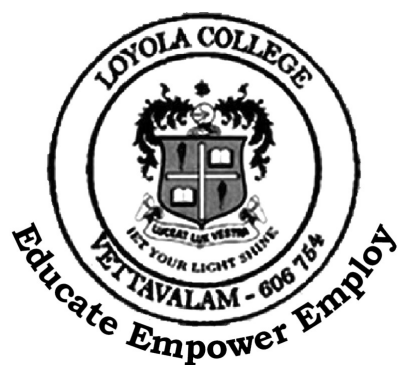

ESSENCE OF TAMIL NADU PROHIBITION OF RAGGING ACT, 1997

I) RAGGING MEANS:

- a) Display of noisy, disorderly conduct doing any act which causes or is likely to cause physical or psychological harm or raise apprehension or fear or shame or embarrassment to a student in any educational institution;
 - b) Teasing, abusing of, playing practical jokes or causing hurt to such students;
 - c) Asking the student to do any act or perform something which such student will not in the ordinary course willingly do.
- ii) Ragging in colleges is a cognizable offence, which means, a Police can arrest without warrant.
 - lii) Ragging within or without any educational institution is totally prohibited.
 - iv) Whoever directly or indirectly commits, participates in, abets or propagates ragging shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two years and shall be liable to a fine which may extend to Rs. 10,000.
 - v) Any student convicted of an offence under Section 4, shall also be dismissed and such student shall not be admitted in any other educational institution.
 - v) Whenever any student complains of ragging to the head of an educational institution or to any other person responsible for the management, such person shall enquire into the same immediately and if found true shall suspend the student, who has committed the offence, from the educational institution.
 - vi) If the head of the educational institution or the person responsible for management of the educational institution, fails or neglects to take action when a complaint of ragging is made to have abetted such action shall be deemed to the offence of ragging and shall be punished as provided for in Section 4 of TNPR Act, 1997.

LOYOLA COLLEGE

History:

Loyola College, Vettavalam, started in the academic year 2009-2010, was a pioneering initiative of the Jesuit Madurai Province to develop and strengthen the Jesuit Chennai Mission in the northern parts of Tamil Nadu. The target group of the College is the rural poor, the first generation learners, the marginalized, the Dalits and the women of the region to educate and empower them. To render this noble service, the Jesuits have chosen this area surrounded by villages and rural poor. While Fr. M. Devadoss, S.J., the then Provincial of Jesuit Madurai Province, and Fr. A. Victor, S.J., the then Superior of Chennai Mission gave the green signal, Most Rev. Dr. P. Soundararaj, Bishop of Vellore welcomed the Jesuits to start the College in his diocese. Fr. R. Arockiaraj, S.J. identified the land, Fr. Maria Joe, S.J., the Mission Treasurer, teamed with Fr. Francis P. Xavier, SJ, Director, LICET took interest to raise the fund and Fr. H. Ignatius Amalraj, S.J. and his team raised the necessary infrastructure. The Government of Tamil Nadu through its G.O. Ms No. 164 Higher Education (EI) Department dated 4th June 2009, granted approval for starting the Loyola College of Arts and Science as a Self-Financing Co-Education College. The Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore granted affiliation to Loyola College on 24th June 2009 (Ref. No. A. 928). The College started to function from 15th July, 2009 with 195 students, distributed to five Under Graduate Degree Courses (English, B.Com., BBA, BCA and B.Sc Computer Science). The official inauguration of the College took place on 31st July, 2009, the feast day of St. Ignatius of Loyola, the Founder of the Society of Jesus and Patron of Loyola College.

OUR TRADITION

The Name 'LOYOLA'



'LOYOLA' is the family name of St. Ignatius of Loyola. He was born in the ancestral castle known as LOYOLA in 1491 in Spain. St. Ignatius was a man of great ambition and he served as a soldier in the army and hoped to gain name and fame from the King of Spain. He enlisted himself in the border wars with France and was badly wounded in a battle at Pamplona in 1521. As he lay convalescing at his Loyola castle, he read the Gospel narratives (**Imitation of Christ**) and the **Lives of Saints** and was inspired by the heroic Lives of the Saints. To follow Christ and to serve Him alone, he decided to give up all worldly ambitions and embraced a life of poverty, simplicity and service after the example of the saints. He began a new life at the age of 31. He spent a year of severe penance and intense prayer in a solitary cave on the banks of the river Cardoner near the town of Manresa in Spain. He recorded all his experiences in a book which came to be called the "Spiritual Exercises" of St. Ignatius. This book is considered as the spiritual centre and the source of inspiration for all his followers. He then went to Paris to receive university education and while studying in Sorbonne University, St. Ignatius motivated his companions and room-mates and with them he established the Society of Jesus in 1540. One of his companions was St. Francis Xavier who came to India in 1542 and established the Jesuit presence and history in the country. The members of the Society of Jesus are popularly known as "Jesuits".

The Jesuits:

The Society of Jesus is a world-wide organisation of religious men, numbering about 18,000, spread all over the world, of whom over 4000 are working in the 18 Jesuit Provinces of India. In Tamil Nadu alone, there are around 500 Jesuits involved in Schools and Colleges, youth services and social work centres, in parishes and in mission stations and in almost any and every form of service and ministry of the Church.

Jesuit Higher Education

Jesuit Higher Education in Madurai Province, Tamil Nadu today draws its inspiration from the two epoch-making statements, namely, the **“Vision Statement”** and **“Preamble to Jesuit Higher Education”**, that originated in the Madurai Province Meet of 1985.

Excerpts from the Vision Statement

- ❖ “We understand that the contemporary equivalent of the mission of salvation is the integral liberation of man which is crystalised for us today in an ardent desire to work ***towards liberation together with the poor***”.
- ❖ ***“The preferential option for the poor*** means that we cast our lot with them through concerted social action. Our love is, indeed, for all human beings, but it assumes different forms. We love the oppressed by espousing their cause and we love the oppressor by emancipating him from his greed and domination which dehumanizes him”.

Excerpts from the Preamble to Jesuit Higher Education

- ❖ “Our educational institutions will shape our students into agents of social change, preparing them for concerted social action and thus paving the way to mass

movements which will bring about the desired liberation”.

- ❖ “They will, in their admission policies, actualise our preferential option for the poor by “giving a privileged place to the weak who are poor economically and academically and form them as men for others”. Stamped with Ignatian hallmark of excellence and relevance, “they will change the existing educational system into reorienting it in order to respond to the crying needs of arts, sciences and relevant pedagogy which would help them build a just social order”.

Loyola College - Goals and Objectives:

The primary aim of Loyola College is to provide University education in a Christian atmosphere to deserving students, especially those belonging to the Catholic Christian Community. Although this College is meant primarily for Catholics, it will not discriminate students belonging to other religions. The College is committed to admit students irrespective of caste and creed. The College aims at training young men and women of quality to be leaders in all walks of life and to serve their fellowmen in justice, truth and love. It is expected that this training would play a vital role in bringing about the desired change for the betterment of the people of our country, more particularly the poor and the marginalized sections of society, namely, the Dalits. Further it will foster an atmosphere of intellectual vigour and moral rectitude in which the young men and women of our country may find their fulfilment and achieve greatness as eminent men and women for others.

The Coat of Arms:

The Coat of Arms of the College consists of a shield divided into four quarters with a torch and an open book motif. The crest is the monogram and seal of the Society of Jesus - **IHS**, being the first three letters in Greek of the name, **JESUS**. The open book and the burning torch stand for the education imparted in this College, which challenges the students to live up to the **College motto: LUCEAT LUX VESTRA**, which means, **LET YOUR LIGHT SHINE** (Mathew 5:16). The Students of the College by their learning and good behaviour will become shining light and good example to others.

Vision of the College

Loyola College vibrates with the vision of forming young men and women who will serve others with fine qualities of **Compassion, Competence and Commitment**. The triple expression of this Vision of Loyola is gradually being realised through its triple goals: **“Educate, Empower and Employ”**.

Affiliation

Loyola College, Vettavalam is affiliated to the Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore. As a Self-Financing Co-Education College, the institution will abide by the rules and regulations of the Government of Tamil Nadu and the Thiruvalluvar University. The University Inspection Commission visited the College on 29th May 2010 and submitted its report for Fresh and Continuation of Affiliation for the different courses offered by the College.

ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION

Any student who has successfully completed the Tamil Nadu Higher Secondary Examinations (Academic or Vocational Stream) or any other course recognized by the Thiruvalluvar University or equivalent to it is eligible for admission to the Degree Courses offered in Loyola College.

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

Application for admission should be made in the prescribed form which can be obtained from the College Office. Candidates who are seeking admission are requested to read the prospectus and the instructions given in the application form thoroughly and carefully before filling in the application form. Incomplete application forms are liable to be rejected.

HOW TO APPLY

The duly filled- in application form along with the following documents should reach the College office on or before the dates mentioned in the communication letter/prospectus.

Documents to be attached

1. Attested photo copy of the qualifying examination Mark Statement (12th Std).
2. Attested photo copy of the Community Certificate (BC/ MBC/DNC/SC/ST).
3. Attested photo copy of Certificate of proof for Differently Abled / Sports/ NCC/NSS/ Ex-Serviceman etc.
4. Parish Priest's Letter by all the Catholics.

Submission of Application :

In Person: Application can be submitted IN PERSON at the College office in the administrative block and collect your acknowledgement card.

By Post: You can send your application along with a self-addressed (Rs.5/ stamped) envelope to **THE PRINCIPAL, LOYOLA COLLEGE, VETTAVALAM 606 754, TIRUVANNAMALAI DISTRICT**, to receive your acknowledgment card by post. Please note that the College is not responsible for any postal delay. Incomplete applications will be summarily rejected.

SELECTION

Communication will be sent only to those who are provisionally selected for admission in the College. The provisionally selected candidates will have to present themselves along with their parents for interview with the Principal on the date mentioned in the call letter without fail. The provisional selection is automatically cancelled if the candidate fails to be present for the interview on the scheduled date and time mentioned in the call letter. Call letters for the interview are sent by POST to the candidates.

However, the candidates can find the status detail of their application through telephone to the College office.

INTERVIEW

The following original certificates and other documents should be produced at the time of interview for verification and must be handed over to the College office once the admission is confirmed.

Original Certificates to be produced

1. Qualifying examination Mark Statement (Plus Two)
2. Transfer Certificate and Conduct Certificate
3. Community Certificate (SC/ST, BC, MBC / DNC)
4. Certificate of proof for Differently Abled / Sports / NCC/ NSS/Ex-serviceman, etc.

Note: Candidates coming for the interview should be prepared to pay the fees on or before the deadline if they are selected in the interview.

MODE OF PAYMENT

The provisionally selected candidate is expected to pay the prescribed fees BY CASH at the Lakshmi Vilas Bank, Extension Branch located in the College Office on the date and time specified in the call letter without fail. If the candidate fails to pay the fees at the prescribed date and time, the provisional selection will be automatically cancelled.

Note: The fees mentioned above include admission, tuition, lab, library, outreach programme maintenance & infrastructure facility, water and electricity charges.

WITHDRAWAL

A student once enrolled for a course is expected to complete the same. He/ she may not withdraw from the college without informing the Principal in writing. Otherwise he/she will be liable to pay the fees for the period of his / her name remaining on the nominal roll.

Keeping with the Jesuit tradition in higher education, Loyola College emphasizes a minimum of 85% attendance from every student to become eligible to appear for University semester examinations. Students, if they are sick, they should produce valid medical certificate immediately after their sick leave when they resume attending classes.

In the calculation of attendance, the following method is adopted for marking absence. The absence of a student from the class in the college is marked thus:

- * If a student is absent either in the First Session (before break) or in the Second Session (after break), he / she will be marked absent for half a day.
- * If he /she is absent for two hours on the same day in two different sessions (before & after the break), he / she will be marked absent for the full day.

All public holidays are treated as holidays for the College, which are indicated in the College calendar. Depending on the need, the College will be working on Saturdays unless otherwise mentioned.

LEAVE

Students who require leave must apply, in advance in the prescribed form available in the College Office and submit the form to the Vice Principal. The application form for leave must be countersigned by the parent or guardian in attestation of the reasons for which leave is sought. If a student is absent without leave, his/her absence will immediately be reported to his/her parents and disciplinary action will be taken. Continued absence without leave

will render a student liable to have his/her name struck off the rolls. Necessary exemption may be given for absence on medical grounds, provided proper medical certificate is presented to the Vice-Principal in the specified leave application form immediately after the student returns to the class.

SPORTS AND GAMES

Students are encouraged to take active part in the various Sports/Games activities provided by the College to enable their healthy growth and personality development.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Government scholarships are available for students belonging to SC/ST. The following Govt. Scholarships are available.

1. SC / ST Hindus and SC / ST, MBC / DNC and BC converts to Christianity Scholarships.
2. Minority Scholarships (Christians, Muslims, etc...)
3. Central Govt Scholarships

Besides the Government scholarships, deserving students could approach the College Management (Principal) for financial assistance. Students are encouraged to avail themselves of such facilities. Information will be displayed on the notice board for Scholarships.

EXTENSION ACTIVITIES

With the aim of providing integrated personality development, students are encouraged to participate in the extension activities through which they come into contact with the stark realities prevailing in the neighbourhood. The following service units function in the College : Eco Club, AICUF, NSS, RRC, YRC. Students are encouraged to join in any one of the units and extend their service to the neighbourhood communities.

LOYOLA OUTREACH PROGRAMME

Loyola Outreach is an extension activity of the College. It is a compulsory programme for all the IInd year UG students. They must spend 40 hours in a village allotted by the College. Since it is part of the academic programme of the College, students who fail to fulfil 40 hours in the village, will not be eligible to get their UG Degree Certificate. Students of the Department will have a department staff to guide them in the Loyola Outreach Programme.

ATTENTION TO STUDENTS

- ★ Smoking is strictly forbidden in the College premises.
- ★ The use of alcohol and drugs is strictly prohibited.
- ★ Any student found using drugs or other intoxicants will be summarily dismissed from the College.
- ★ Ragging in any form is a serious offence and those indulging in it will be summarily dismissed.
- ★ Possession of **camera cell-phone is strictly prohibited** in the campus. Use of **mobile phone inside classroom/ lab/library/ along the corridors is strictly forbidden.**
- ★ Students should keep decorum in their behaviour in the College premises and maintain the identity of Loyolites even outside.
- ★ Students should use the Library for reference as well as for reading and use Computer Lab for academic purpose only.
- ★ Students must cultivate the habit of reading the information exhibited on notice boards that are fixed in different places in the main block.
- ★ Students should keep the campus neat and clean.
- ★ Waste materials should be thrown into the litter boxes.

Parents/Guardians are reminded that they are to show more interest and enthusiasm in the progress and development of their sons / daughters / wards. Loyola College expects Parents / Guardians to co-operate with the Management and Staff in the education and discipline of their children /wards. They should monitor the students' attendance, progress in studies and their general conduct in and outside the College. Parents are asked to take special note of the warning issued to students.

Parents are also informed that the College is committed to accommodate a larger number of poorer students in the College.

CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS)

As per the regulations of the Thiruvalluvar University, Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is a flexible system of learning, which is being followed in Tamil Nadu from the Academic Year 2008-2009. 'Credit' defines the quantum of Contents/Syllabus prescribed for a course and determines the number of hours of instruction required. The distinguishing features of CBCS are the following:

CBCS permits the students

- ❖ to learn at their own pace
- ❖ to choose electives from a wide range of elective courses offered by the different departments of the College.
- ❖ to undergo additional courses and acquire more than the required number of credits
- ❖ to adopt an inter - disciplinary approach to learning
- ❖ to make the best use of the expertise of available faculty.

(B). Those who have studied Tamil up to XII Std and taken a Non-Tamil Language under Part - I shall take Advanced Tamil comprising of two courses.

(C). Others who do not come under A and B can choose Non-Major Elective (NME) comprising of two courses. Two NME should be taken in the same department.

2. SKILL BASED ELECTIVE (SBE) SUBJECTS :

Four courses will to be offered. The Compulsory papers will be accommodated in the second / third year of study for UG courses.

PART - V : EXTENSION ACTIVITIES
